BEST PRACTICE I

Title: Greater Involvement of Teachers in Research Activities

Goal: It has become necessary that teachers, in addition to their usual teaching and allied duties, should carry out research work in order to keep themselves updated about the latest developments in their respective subjects. Through new research work and research paper

publications, teachers can make their students aware of the avenues open for them and enhance the spirit of inquiry and logic among the interested students.

The college Authority provides ample support to the teachers. Teachers who are interested in obtaining funds for research projects from UGC, ICSSR are encouraged and given facility of rooms etc. Out of 14 Full-time Teachers, 07 are Ph.D Degree holders. The teachers who have completed or are pursuing doctoral work are always given few relaxations from college duties in the final stage of their preparation of thesis. This support has been very humane. Moreover, teachers are encouraged by College authority to participate in various faculty development programmes like Orientation Course, Refresher Course, Summer/Winter School, seminars organized by Academic Staff Colleges of different Universities. Teachers are encouraged to participate in State Level, National Level and International Seminars. Teachers are encouraged to apply for MRP also.

The Context: Kandra Radhakanta Kundu Mahavidyalaya is situated in a remote rural area of Burdwan District, West Bengal. The place is not only distant from any Municipal area; it also lacks proper public transport from the nearby *mufassil* towns. Also, there is no well equipped Library to cater to the needs of students pursuing research activities. There is no specialized research institution close by. Hence, faculty members have to depend on the libraries of Kolkata or other Universities for accessing modern research articles, relevant books or for consultation with experts. The nearest resource facility is Burdwan University or Central Library of Visva Bharati which is many kilometers away from the college. Power cuts are regular, speed of internet is slow and erratic, vacant teaching posts put excessive pressure on the existing teachers, class load is heavy; in spite of all these difficulties, the spirit of teachers to take up research works is high. Obviously, the role of the college is vital and full of positivity and encourages teachers to engage in research work.

The Practice: The College has set up a Research and Development Sub Committee to help in preparing research proposals. It recommends proposals of faculty members to funding agencies like UGC.

The college has allocated a room for conducting the research of an MRP of the Department of Geography.

The college continually up grades the library with new books. Teachers have a Library Day that enables them to use external libraries for writing papers.

The college encourages faculty members to attend and present papers at different State Level, National and International seminars. These academic events actually give exposure to faculty members to new vistas of research which in turn impacts their teaching. The college also encourages teachers to have their papers and research findings published in reputed journals. The college desires teachers to take up research whose output can be related to local needs.

Evidence of Success: The encouragement given by the college to take up research work and publication of research papers has had a positive impact:

One of the faculty members has completed one minor and one major project funded by UGC and ICSSR respectively. The said faculty member has presented papers in two International Seminars, one in Sri Lanka and the other in UK. Some of the faculty members have completed their research work and have been awarded Ph.D Degree after joining the college. Most of the teachers regularly publish research papers in reputed peer reviewed journals of State level, National and International Standard.

Problems encountered and Resources Required:

Teachers have been encouraged to pursue research alongside their usual teaching assignments and they are sincerely trying to achieve academic heights despite many limitations.

- The scarcity of man power in office unfortunately engages the teachers of this college in various official duties besides their regular classes, tutorials and other academic duties.
- Vacant teaching posts are a persistent burden on the existing teachers. Though the spirit of the teachers is high, yet very often they are exhausted due to heavy workload and find it difficult to complete syllabus on time. In some of these vacant posts Part Time Teachers (PTTs) or the Contractual Whole Time Teachers (CWTTs) have been appointed. Though they are quite efficient and dedicated, yet Full Time Teachers have to shoulder most of the teaching and administrative assignments. Despite all these difficulties faculty members have taken up research projects and completed them successfully. They have also made valuable contribution to journals and other publications.
- Many Departments lack adequate number of teaching posts
- Weak internet connection in Kandra deters communication and academic activity of teachers
- Long power cuts on a daily basis is frustrating
- No formal academic institutions in the surrounding area to exchange views etc. is definitely a handicap
- The college is not entitled to grant leave with full pay to teachers for carrying out research projects. Leave application of teacher is forwarded by the Principal with the recommendation of the Governing Body to the Director of Public Instruction (DPI), Govt. of West Bengal. The permission involves a very long process and teachers do not feel interested to wait for such a long time.
- To encourage better research work, it is imperative that the Government shall take necessary measures to sanction adequate number of teaching posts and to fill up new and existing posts.

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Best Practice II

Title: Lectures by invited speakers in College Seminars

Kandra, the location of the College is backward and mostly agricultural. The College has a large number of students from the marginalized sections of rural Bengal. Most of them belong to poor, backward and underprivileged families and are first generation learners. Therefore, a need is felt to motivate them to higher studies- the prime aim of any institute of Higher Education.

They need a basic knowledge of their chosen subject, which most of them cannot acquire at Higher Secondary Level. The teaching pattern, text book oriented classes, preparation for examination—all are very different in the college than what they learn in their schools.

To motivate such students, the College has started the practice of 'College seminars' on different topics of various subjects. The college invites speakers from other academic institutions to deliver lectures to the students. This endeavour helps the students to have an in-depth knowledge of subjects, and gives better exposure through presentations by enlightened academicians. These activities throughout the year, helps to build up their confidence. Though the seminars are organized on a small scale with a very limited fund, yet the college makes it a point to invite the teachers of the respective subjects of the feeder schools in surrounding areas.

The Context:

Kandra Radhakanta Kundu Mahaviyalaya has Jnanadas Memorial Boys' High School and a Girls' Secondary School and a primary school in its proximity. There is one more Government Primary school within Kandra *Panchayat* area.

The applicants of this college mostly come from a rural base and many of them are first generation learners belonging to economically underprivileged classes. Most of these students have never stepped out of their village, do not have internet connection or do not have proper internet facility in their locality. To read newspapers, a good number of them have to go to the local clubs where newspapers are subscribed. Therefore, most of them are completely ignorant

about the importance of higher education, about the ways to achieve good results, and to prepare themselves to compete in the job market. Seen against the background of a fast progressing India, it is quite disappointing.

The Practice: In this context, the college adopted the practice of organizing seminars to enable the students to be aware of the new vistas of knowledge. Many eminent Professors and scholars have visited the college and delivered lectures.

The College also arranges seminar on Nabi Divas with the help of Students' Union.

Evidence of success: This practice proved to be successful as the students' participation is quite impressive. Though they feel shy to ask questions to the invited speakers after the seminar, they feel no hesitation in discussing the same with their teachers.

On the whole, this effort seems to help the students grow intellectually. They are also more comfortable with the prescribed syllabi. Through organizing seminars, stage decoration, reception of learned persons they also attain confidence, courtesy and manners.

Problems Encountered and Resources Required:

- Being first generation learners, they often fail to understand the importance of these activities during the first few months of their college life.
- Very limited fund for college seminars
- A remote place like Kandra always faces few inevitable constraints in communication that eventually becomes a serious obstacle in inviting scholars from different academic institutions for conducting national or local seminars.
